FROM THE PRESIDENT

Evolving Environment



Dear Composting Community,
I have been honored to serve as your NC
Composting Council President for the previous two
years and have agreed to continue for another two,
per the Board's request. 2018 was both exciting
and challenging due to our **Evolving**Environment. I believe this term is

indicative of both the changes we are experiencing to the climate outside our window and the climate within North Carolina and the NC Composting Council.

I am certainly preaching to the choir with many of you regarding the impact humankind is having on the world's climate. Yet, it is amazing the negative connotation the term "climate change" can carry, which is why I chose to use this less polarizing term. Those involved in the composting industry have a strong belief and understanding of what we need to accomplish to help reduce the negative impact civilization is making on our environment. Composting and the use of compost, along with many other sustainable practices, has become second nature to most of us. But there is still a lot of work to be done to educate the general public how they, too, can make a difference. That leads me to the main focus of my message.....we need your help! The efforts exhibited by our current board and committee members have been nothing less than outstanding, but it takes more than those dedicated individuals that devote their time and energies to the NCCC. We have large aspirations, but unless we can encourage some of you and your peers to join us in some capacity, we will not evolve and make the impact the council is striving to achieve.

The NCCC's commitment to education continued this year through conducting our annual Compost Operators Training Course in conjunction with the US Composting Council and its Composting Council Research and Education Foundation. We were again challenged with not one, but TWO hurricanes, forcing some of the attendees to not attend or leave early so they could be back on the job helping to prepare their communities for the pending storms. We welcomed attendees from as far away as New Zealand and again received wonderful feedback on the content of the course and the professionalism of our speakers, who graciously offered their services at no cost to the NCCC. We also supported and exhibited at the Waste Not, Living the Low Carbon Life conference, helping the attendees to learn how to become involved with composting and reducing their carbon footprint.

Our goals moving forward are much more ambitious, starting with a plan to enact a policy to reduce and manage food waste at the municipal level. This is quite an undertaking and will require a huge commitment of time and effort to work with local and state legislators discussing a potential structure to enact legislation or regulatory requirements for an organic waste ban, hopefully leading to an organics recycling law. We have also begun discussing how the NCCC can enact a program similar to the Marin County Carbon Project in North Carolina, leading to increased carbon sequestration by using compost to amend our soils throughout the state. I would like each of you to join me in thanking all of our sponsors and the many individuals that have offered their time and efforts in their commitment to the council and the composting community. I encourage each of you to take a few minutes to learn about our committees and consider offering ONLY 1-2 hours a month by joining in. We look forward to the future and doing what we can to positively impact our Evolving Environment!

In 2018, the NCCC hosted/ co-hosted 8 Sustainable Spirits events and garnered over 300 attendees.



COMPOST OPERATIONS TRAINING COURSE

About

During the Fall of 2018, the NC Composting Council partnered with the US Composting Council to put together the week-long Compost Operations Training Course (COTC) at NC State University in Raleigh. The training brought together 30 professionals looking to advance their composting training to the next level.

This 40-hr, 5-day course focused on giving participants the knowledge needed to run a successful composting facility. In addition to in-depth lectures, the course provided hands-on practice through indoor and outdoor activities as well as tours to local facilities, where the theories met reality.

Curriculum

- Day 1: Composting process, feedstocks and recipe development, compost systems
- Day 2: Equipment, safety, site design, environmental protection (odors and stormwater), regulations
- Day 3: Composting facility tours and NCDA Soil Lab
- Day 4: Compost testing, product quality, compost uses and marketing
- Day 5: Facility management, trouble-shooting and analyzing compost piles

Advisory Committee


